STEP 1 - INTERVIEWS


When and where were they born?

Talk to your parents, grandparents, great-grandparents, aunts and uncles, and anyone in your family older than you.

In addition to writing the answers, we suggest recording the conversation and keeping the recording. Always ask permission first to record the conversation.

STEP 3 - DOCUMENTATION

Begin collecting copies of death and birth certificates and marriage licenses based on the state and county in which the record was created. The best place to begin is a state's health department website as most allow you to request these documents online or by phone. However, be prepared to pay fees as all states charge for copies of death and birth certificates and marriage licenses. We can help you identify the correct state website if you need assistance. The Local History and Genealogy Department does have some records for Lucas County, so ask us for help with Lucas County records before you request those through the state.



STEP 4 - DEEP DIVE

Visit our Local History and Genealogy Department to start a deeper dive. We can connect you with Genealogy books and research materials that will help your family history come alive. Plan to spend at least an hour (or more!) with us as none of our materials are able to be checked out.
