You must have an appointment to visit an office.</p> <p>Field offices in the U.S. and its territories provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Interviews for all non-asylum cases (for example, getting a Green Card).</li> <li>• Naturalization ceremonies; and</li> <li>• Appointments for information and applicant services that supplement what is provided through the website and by phone (for example, case-specific scenarios that require in-person help).</li> </ul>  |
